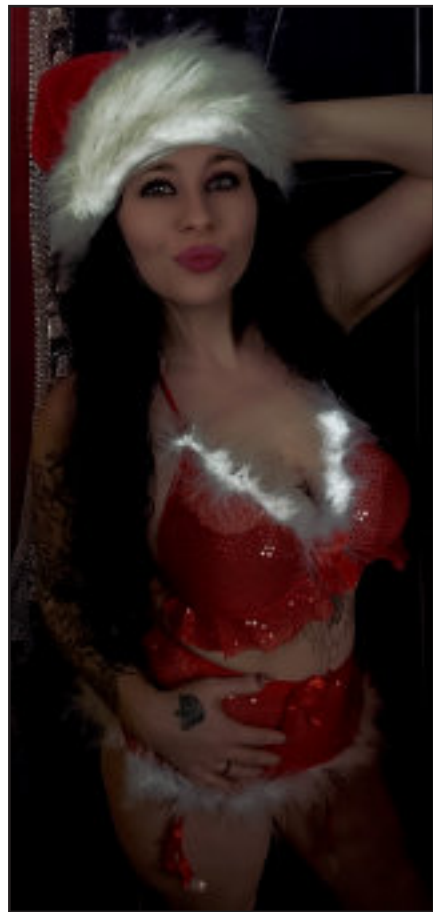

Each piece is designed with longevity in mind, built to age heavy, readable, and powerful rather than follow short-lived trends.

He is the owner and founder of Apothic Ink Tattoo Studio, a unique creative space that operates not only as a professional tattoo studio but also as a live concert venue. Apothic Ink has become a hub for underground art and music, blending tattoo culture with live performances and fostering a community driven by creativity, expression, and authenticity.

Charlie's path to success was not conventional. Before tattooing, he came from a criminal background and lived a life marked by instability and poor choices. Tattooing became the turning point that redirected his future. What began as an outlet quickly evolved into an obsession, a discipline, and ultimately a career that replaced destruction with purpose. 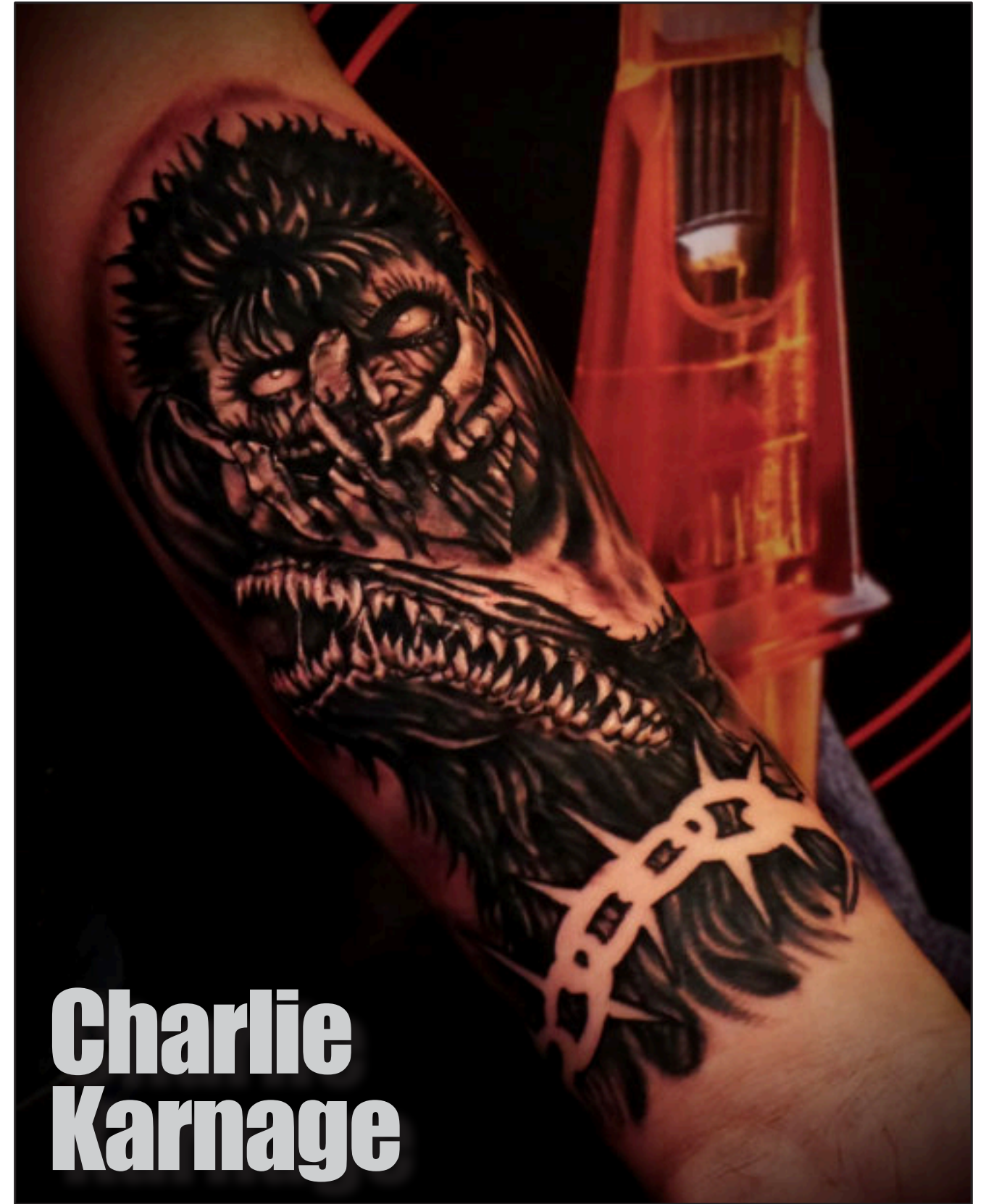
Today, Charlie Karnage stands as an example of transformation through art—proof that creativity, when taken seriously, can rebuild a life and create something lasting.

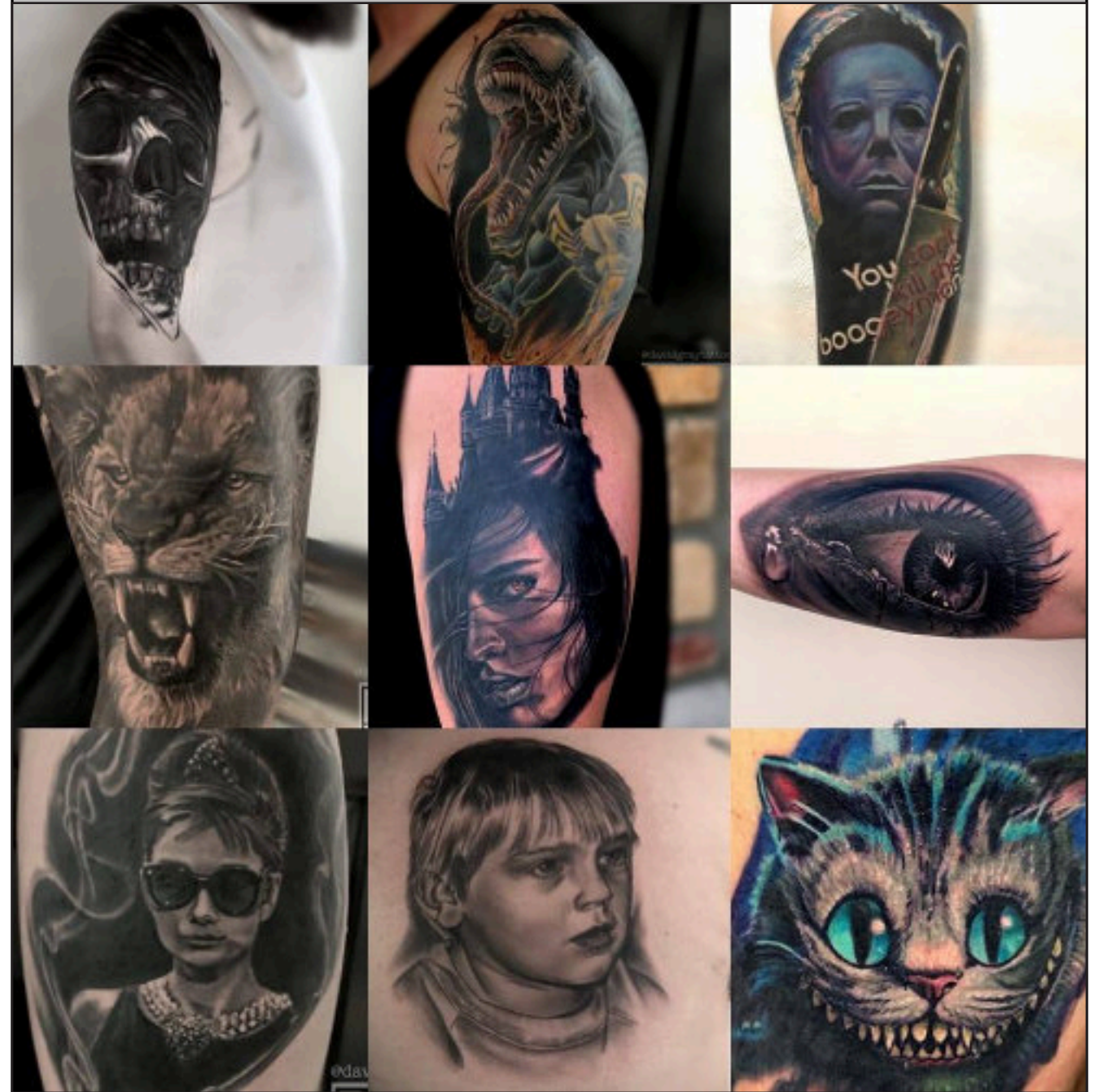


David Gray, based in Davison, is renowned for exceptional skill in black & gray, realism. I got my start as a teen creating art for furniture stores and then

I've loved tattoos for as long as I can remember. One of my earliest memories is from third grade—my older brother Mike would draw these badass skulls on my arm with a BIC pen, then scratch them in with a sewing needle. I'd strut into school the next day showing them off, feeling like the toughest kid on the playground. I was hooked on that attention, that outlaw vibe. When I turned 18, I got my first real ink—from Mike, of course, in my parents' garage like a proper rebel. I hid it from them for years.

After high school, though, tattooing wasn't something people thought of as a career. My other brother Robert got me into HVAC, and I climbed the corporate ladder pretty fast. But around 30, I started feeling trapped. The whole 9-to-5 thing felt so artificial—like a fish in a fishbowl. Fake lunchroom chats with people you wouldn't normally talk to, forced smiles, ending emails with 'Thank you' when someone just piled more work on you. The thought of doing that for another 35–40 years? Insane. I vented to Mike one day, and he just said, 'Learn to tattoo. I'm booked out years in advance—people fly in from all over the world to get work from me, and I only have two hands. It's the best job ever.' That was it. I kept the day job, but every spare moment I was learning from him. And the rest is history.

In my mid-40s now, I've learned that words carry real weight. Over time, I've seen how we overuse certain ones until they lose their meaning. 'Artist' is one of those. You hear baristas call themselves 'latte artists,' or someone splashes paint on a canvas and calls it performance art. It can feel a little silly.

To me, a true artist is someone who can take an image from their mind, project it onto skin or canvas, and create something undeniably beautiful. It's a rare mix of raw talent and deep devotion. It's not a title you just claim—it's something you aspire to become.

That's my goal in life: to one day truly earn the right to call myself an artist. Not just a tattooer who's good at their job, but someone whose work moves people, lasts, and reflects that level of craft and heart. I'm still working toward it every single day.

My proudest achievement in this career isn't any one tattoo or milestone—it's the friendships I've been lucky enough to build over the years. Clients who drive hours, hop on planes, wait patiently for an appointment... that kind of loyalty blows me away every time.

The trust they put in me, letting me mark their skin permanently with something meaningful to them—that's sacred. At the end of the day, it's the clients who make tattooing such a dream job. They're the reason I get to do this, and I'm grateful for every single one.

The biggest challenge right now—and it's one a lot of us in the industry are facing—is the economy. People are hurting financially. Food, rent, basics—everything's gone up so much that there's just less disposable income left for things like tattoos. It's not just us; nail salons, barbers, hair and makeup artists, even fine dining... a lot of service-based, 'luxury' businesses are feeling it. For me, that means quieter periods in the shop, having to turn down cool projects because clients can't swing it right now, or stretching out payment plans. It's tough watching good people put their stories on hold. But it also reminds me why those friendships and that trust matter so much—clients who can make it in still show up, and the ones who can't, I know they'll be back when things ease up. These slow stretches test your patience and force you to get creative, but they've also made me appreciate the highs even more.

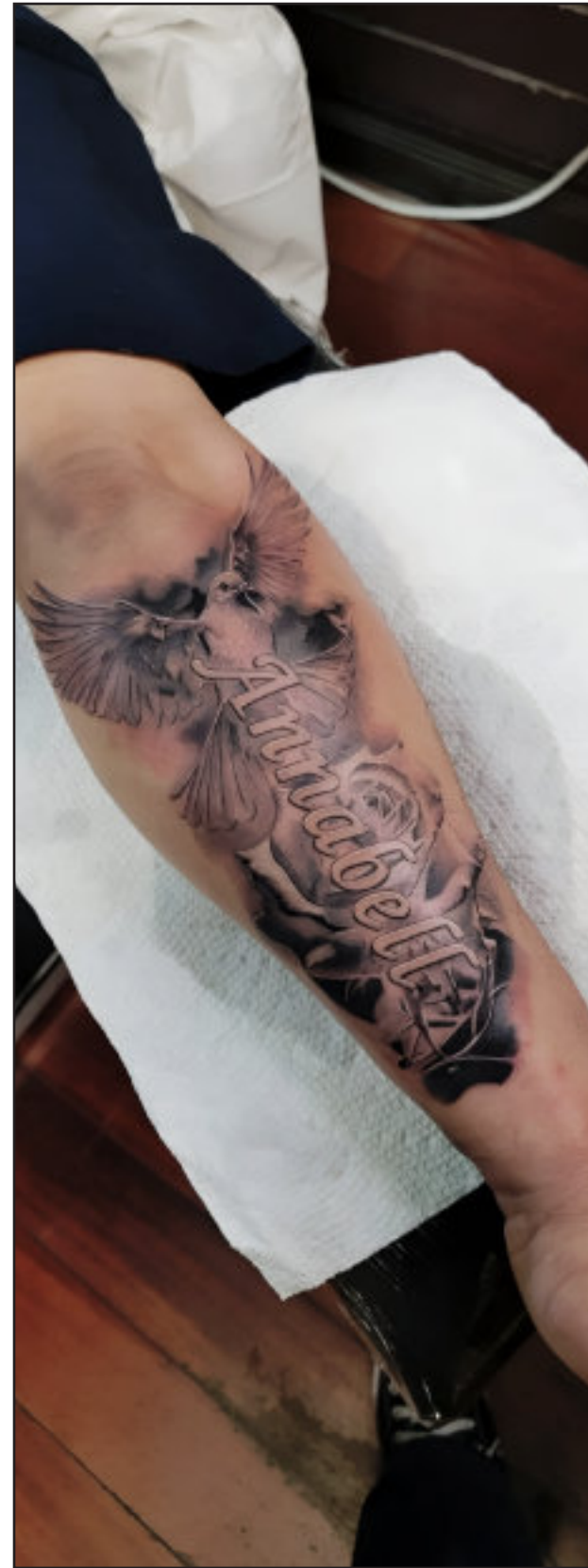
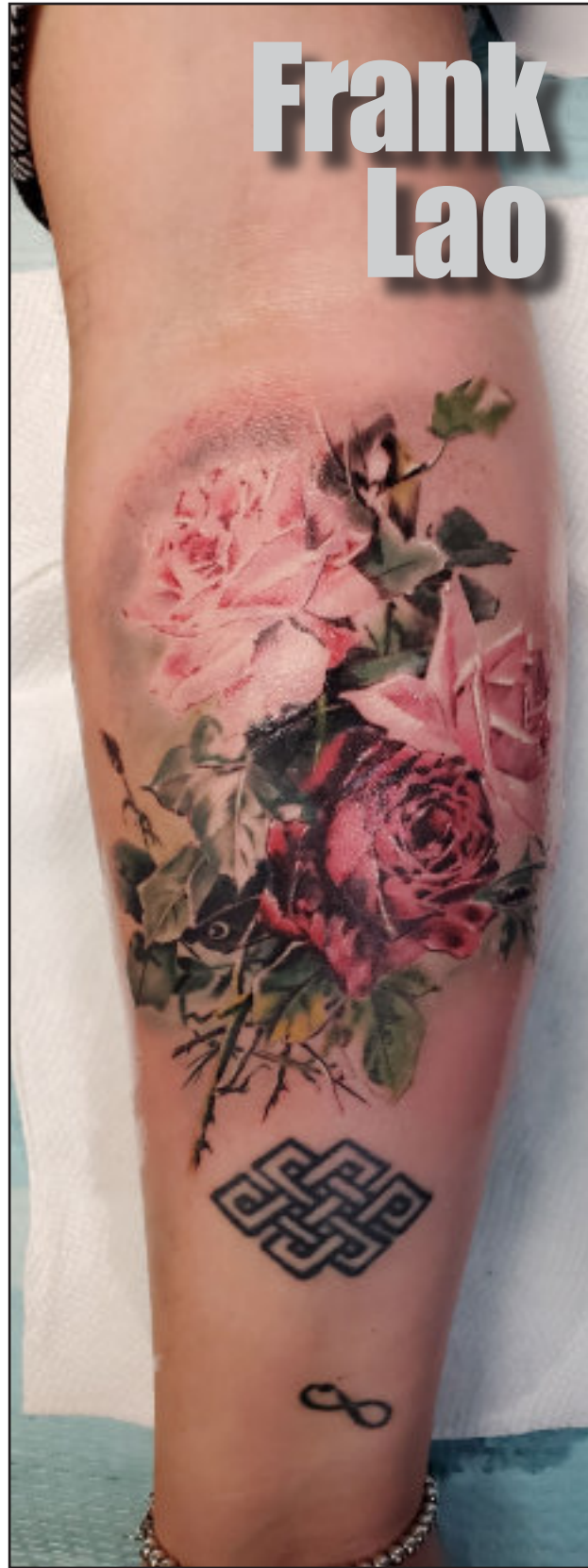
Looking back, every part of this journey—the playground skulls, the garage tattoos, ditching the corporate life, building these friendships, pushing to become a real artist—it's all been worth it. Even with the current challenges, I wouldn't trade this for anything. Tattooing gave me freedom, real connections, and a way to create something lasting. I'm still that kid who loved feeling like an outlaw... just a little older, wiser, and grateful every day that I get to do this.







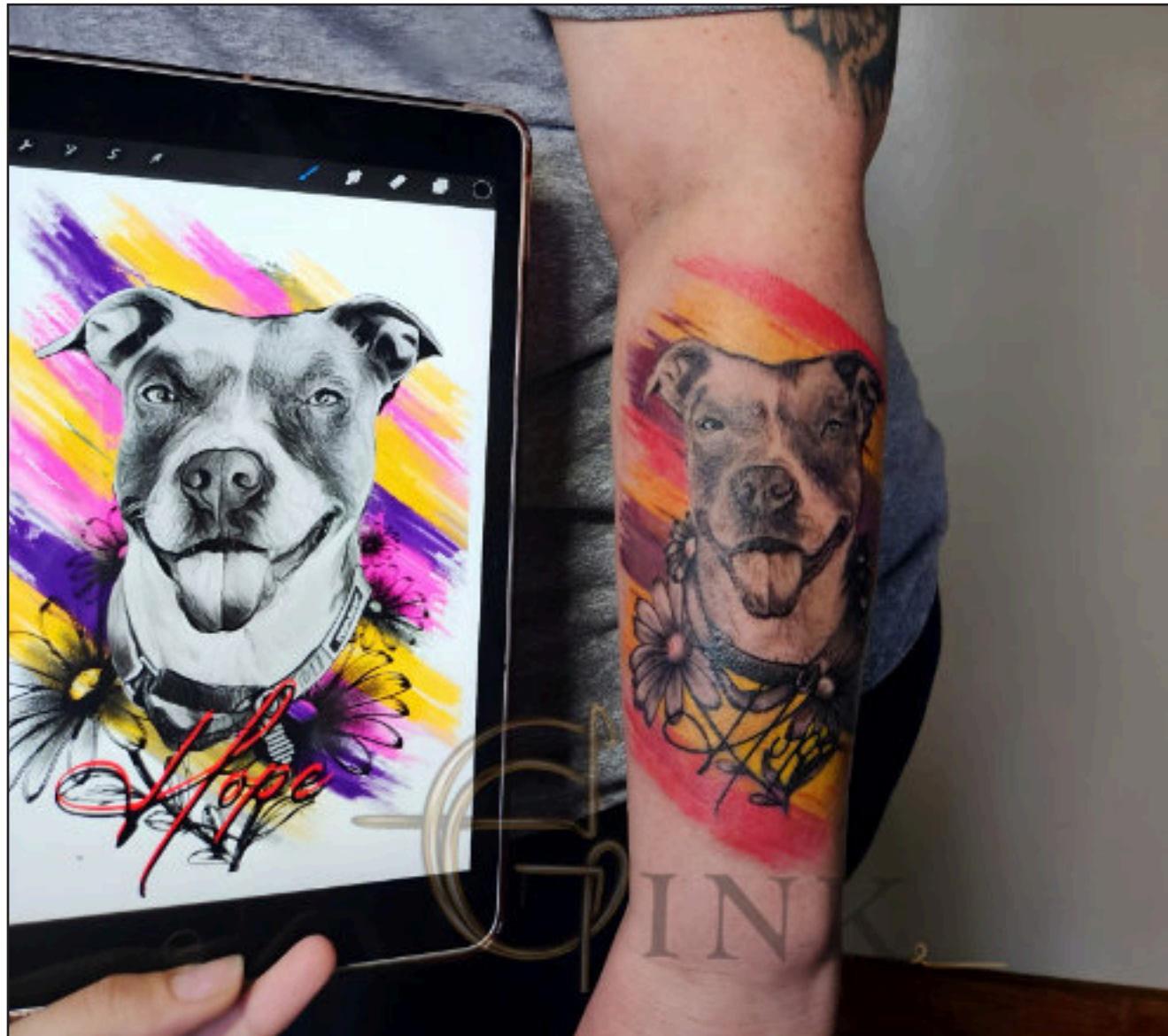






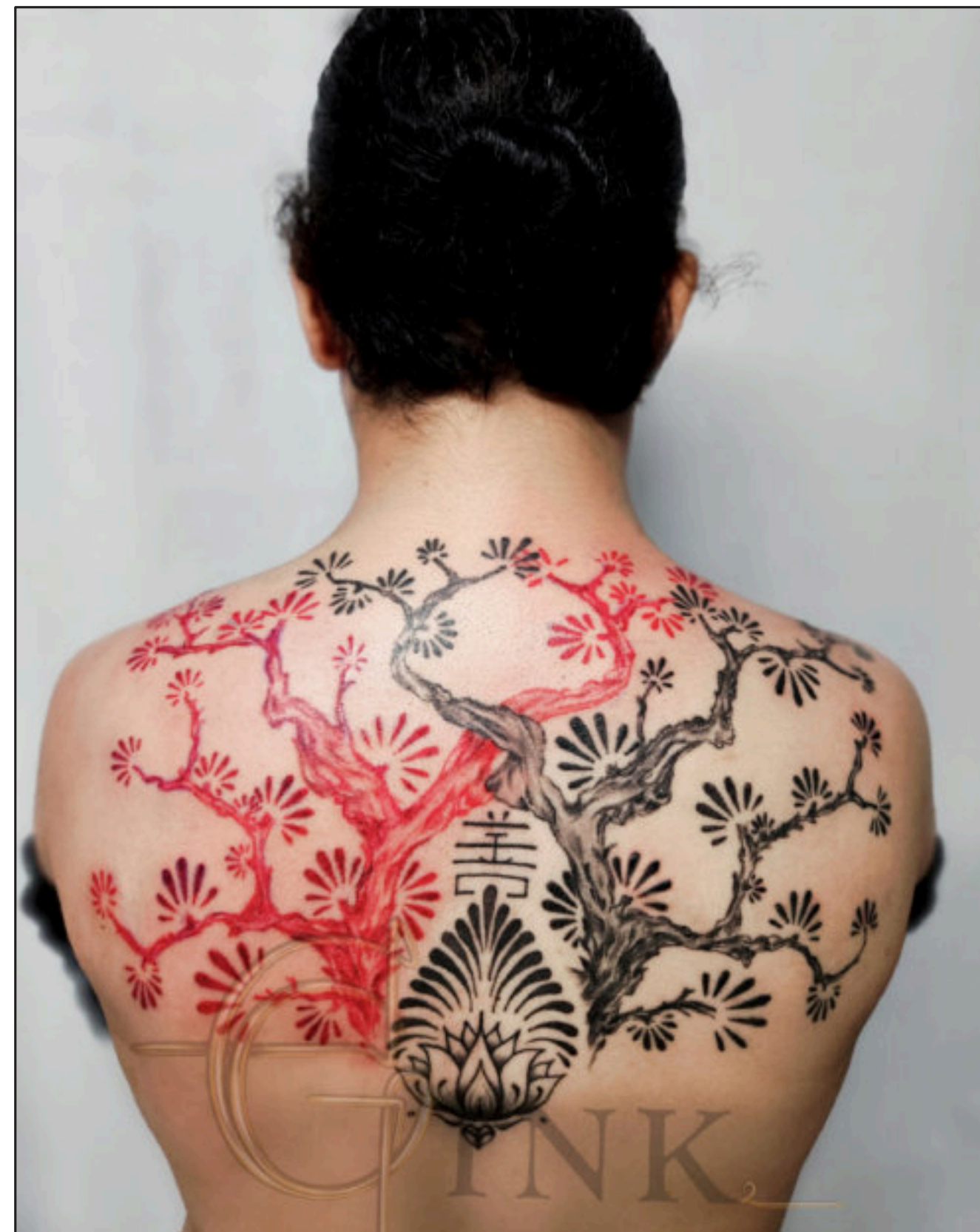

My name is Vanessa Marie Morbeck, and my fitness journey is not just about aesthetics—it is about survival, rebuilding, and transforming pain into a platform that inspires thousands. I am a U.S. Army Veteran, a single mother, an athlete, and a growing voice within the military and fitness communities.

## My Story

My journey didn't begin in a gym—it began in the darkest moments of my life. I survived military trauma, homelessness, financial collapse, and emotional battles that nearly broke me. From 2016 to 2023, I was homeless, rebuilding myself piece by piece while raising my daughter alone.

Fitness became my sanctuary. It was the one place where discipline translated directly into transformation. That discipline led me to step on stage in 2025, where I competed at the Summer

Shredding Championship in Texas—placing 3rd in my qualifier and 5th in the championship. Standing under those stage lights showed me that my purpose is bigger than my pain: I am here to represent veterans, survivors, and single mothers who refuse to give up.

## My Growing Public Platform

I've built a strong, rapidly growing community by sharing the real, unfiltered journey of a woman fighting her way back to the top.

Today, I've amassed a combined following on Instagram and TikTok, where people connect with my transparency, resilience, and transformation.

My audience follows me because I am real.

Because I don't hide the breakdowns behind the glow-up.

Because my story resonates with every veteran, every mother, and every person who has ever

lost themselves and fought to rise again.

This following—and the impact behind it—is exactly why I'm stepping into military-verified celebrity status. Not because I chased fame, but because authenticity, advocacy, and transformation have created a voice people trust. Veterans, active-duty service members, fitness athletes, and women across the country look to me for guidance, motivation, and proof that healing is possible.

#### Challenges I've Overcome

My journey is marked by adversity:

- Military trauma
- Homelessness
- Being a single mother with no family support
- Eviction notices during prep
- Broken or brittle teeth limiting my diet
- Cortisol weight gain and stress-related health issues
- Emotional trauma from relationships
- Rebuilding my life while staying committed to the gym

Everything I built, I built while struggling. My success was carved from moments most people never talk about. But I talk about them—publicly—because that's what makes



me real, and that's why people follow me.

#### Why I Believe I'm Becoming a Military-Verified Celebrity

Because my story is bigger than fitness. Because I speak for those who are still silent. Because veterans see their own pain in my healing. Because my platform is becoming a home for transformation, mental health advocacy, and powerful storytelling. Because every time I rise, thousands rise with me. I didn't chase celebrity. I chased healing, discipline, and purpose— and the world connected with that.

Today, I am stepping into a new era—one where I use my voice, my platform, and my transformation to inspire and uplift others. I am proud to represent veterans, women, mothers, and athletes everywhere who are rewriting their story.

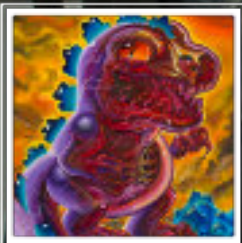
